

"They can be beaten, if we can play as good as or better than we did against Central," stated head coach Bill Nead in reference to West Hi's game against powerful Hamilton, which is to take place at Elder Stadium, Friday, Oct. 24, at 8 p.m.

"We have at least a 50-60 chance, if not better," continued Mr. Nead, The "Big Blues" past record shows victories over Taft, Hughes, Elder and Newark. Purcell upset Hamilton with a 19-12 victory on Oct. 11, leaving Hamilton's record at 4-1. The Big Blue will meet Springfield before playing West Hi.

West Hi has defeated Newport Catholic 39-6, Taft 14-8, and Central 36-0. They were tied by Newport Public 6-6 on a wet and sloppy field. Western's record stands at 3-0-1.

West Hi will employ, as usual, the Split-T, while Hamilton runs the unbalanced line and the slotback. The slot-back is when the end is split about 10 yards and they place one of their backfield men between the end and tackle. They also have good speed, so they'll be running quite a bit.

Much controversy has arisen as to whether a team should go for one or two points after a touchdown has been made. "If we score first we'll kick for one," Coach Nead stated, "but if not, we'll try to run or pass for two."

Jerry Streibig and Tom Moore will alternate at the halfback spot left vacant by the injury to senior, co-captain Harry Ruskaup.

On defense, Hamilton will run a gaining defense, where the linemen will charge one way and the linebackers in a different direction. They also will use the 5-4 defense, which was made famous by the Oklahoma Sooners; that is, five men on the line, four line backers, and two safety men.

Possibly the outstanding member of the Big Blue squad is half-back Fred Bradburry who, according to Coach Nead, "has real good speed." Said Coach Nead, "They have many other stars that will give us a lot of trouble."

Last year, the Maroon Mustangs were soundly defeated at the hands of Hamilton, 25-0. Over the years the Big Blue have dominated play, taking seven of the nine previous encounters. They have outscored Western Hills 192-34 in those nine games.

This year's meeting is of special interest, because this is the last year of existence for Hamilton High. Next year one half of the student body will attend Hamilton Garfield and the other half Hamilton Taft.

Hamilton is coached by Mr. Florio, head coach, Mr. Metcalfe, defensive line coach, and Mr. Smith, backfield coach.



The Wildcats tallied midway through the first quarter and West High countered with a touchdown of their own in the second quarter.



Tom Maddux, senior class president announced to the students that the Graduation Dance would be held at the Pavillon Caprice if proper arrangements could be made.









West Hi basketball coach Bob Rain and three West Hi cage start ers, Wayne Lundy, Rob Yearout, and Ed Brinkman, were honored by representation on the Cincinnati Enquirer's 1960 All-High Basketball squad.

Coach Rain was named "Coach of the Year in the Cincinnati area by a panel of 37 local high school coacnes—an additional tribute for leading West Hi to the Cincinnati District championship.

Lundy led the balloting among all-star first team players and because of this gained the title of honorary captain for the 1960 squad. Wayne received 97 votes, three more than Withrow's Joel Haynes, and 11 more than Centarl's Larry Elsasser. Haynes, by the way, was named "Player of the Year." The big Western center scored 551 points in 25 games for a 22.0 points-per-game average this season.

Forward Yearout was named to the second team, and guard Brinkman gained a position on the third team. Yearout scored 278 points for West Hi, for a points-per-game average of 11.1. Brinkman accounted for 291 points, an average of 11.6 per game.


Ed Brinkman, slugging third baseman and pitcher, led Schiff Shoes to the Class C title, before they lost at Altoona, Pa.

West Hi Meets Elder In 'Turkey Day' Classic

Elder Stadium Opens In 1940

In 1940 the game moved to the new Elder stadium where it has been played ever since. Elder won that first game there 7-0.

In more recent years, perhaps the most thrilling win for West Hi occurred in 1956. In that game, Western snapped a four-year losing streak when, with only minutes remaining, halfback Wayne Streibig scored a touchdown to give the Mustangs a 20-13 victory. The win gave West Hi the "mythical city championship" as Elder was GCL chamof 1956.

1958 saw the PHSL co-champion Mustang squad, headed by their new coach, Mr. Bill Nead, maul the Panthers 31-14. The 31 points amassed by West Hi were the most ever scored by a Maroon team against Elder.

Going into tomorrow's game, Elder with a 6-3 record (at press time) for the season will be heavy favorites. The Panthers started the season fast, winning their first three

games. A loss to a powerful Alliance team seemed to deflate the Panthers as they have won only one game since. A 51-0 loss to Roger Bacon was the worst defeat suffered by an Elder team in years.





Ed Brinkman was high scorer for the two games with six points.









Break for the shower and lunch. Talk about the team, play cards or just sit by yourself and think-everybody wants to be a football hero.







Robert Smith and Bill Reece were the big guns for Hughes as they scored 13 and 12 points, re-





Albert H. Neman, who was legal counsel in a threatened suit against the board, noted that a small group of parents has intimated that certain fraternities or sororities "will continue to operate outside the school system."

Speaking for another group of parents, Mr. Neman issued a statement which said, in part, "The city solicitor has ruled that these groups violate the Ohio code prohibiting fraternities or sororities. The statutes make it a criminal act to organize, join or belong to these groups."

End Of 'Social Clubs' In Public Schools Urged

Abolishment of the Cincinnati Board of Education's system of recognition, regulation and partial supervision of "social clubs" was proposed last night.

It was part of a threepoint recommendation made after a three-year study of high school social clubs conducted by the Cincinnati Public School Foundation. The recommendations and findings of the study committee's research were presented at the Foundation's annual meeting at Central High School.

The committee also recommended that:

The committee suggested that present social clubs be permitted to finish out their existence without recruiting new members.

This, it said, would "eliminate a source of conflict between students and school while terminating the structure within two

REGARDING the expansion of school-wide activities it was proposed, also, that the Board of Education, on a long-range basis, 'might examine the implications of paying for the extra-curricular services of its teaching staff in somewhat the same fashion as is now done for coaches of varsity athletics.


